COORDINATION

Four years ago this month, GVA was invited to feature the work of one artist every six weeks at the Bliss & Vinegar restaurant (B&V) on Forest Hills Avenue in Cascade. This has resulted in great exposure for us as an organization and for each artist that has had their work chosen for display. In 2019, the owners opened a second location in the Downtown Market (GRDTM) on Ionia. Once again, GVA



members have graciously been offered the exclusive opportunity to feature their work. This all came about very recently and the owners were eager to get started. Currently four GVA members have their work on display. Items include tea towels, artisan soaps, 8"x8" canvas-wrapped prints of fruits & vegetables, and assorted note cards. Here's the scoop and scope.

Please do not contact the restaurant directly at this time. If you are interested and feel your work is suitable (as you'll read below) please send digital images of your work to Barb, or send her the link to your website and/or Instagram account.

GENERAL INFORMATION

- B&V will take a 25% pre-sales tax commission on all work
- B&V is responsible for collecting and filing Michigan sales tax
- B&V will provide each artist with appropriate tax forms or summaries at the request of each artist
- All work must be the original design of the artist and must be safe, non-toxic, and fit for its intended use

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- B&V has complete autonomy of inventory sold in the store, and artwork will be arranged and displayed at their discretion
- All sales will go through the cash register at B&V
- Each "exhibit" will run for a period of approximately 3 months (quarterly) unless otherwise determined by B&V
- Each artist is responsible for delivering their artwork and picking up unsold items from the GRDTM B&V store on designated days and times by arrangement with the GVA coordinator
- Each artist will provide the GVA coordinator with a short bio for use in each exhibit which she will format for display
- Each artist will need to provide B&V with their name, an email address and home mailing address
- Each artist will be provided a vendor number by B&V
- Each artist will be required to label their individual items with their vendor number and price
- If a discounted price is offered for multiple-item sales this too must be added to the label
- Payments to artists from B&V will be made by agreement with each artist
- Artist releases B&V, the GRDTM, and GVA from any and all liability
- If an artist feels they need a contract, it will be their responsibility to prepare one and negotiate with B&V directly

THEMES

- Initially B&V would prefer the following themes:
- Food (the store is in the GRDTM), fruits, vegetables, etc.
- Holidays/Seasonal
- Michigan or Grand Rapids

IDEAS WE'VE THOUGHT OF TO SELL

- Small pieces of original 2D artwork, not larger than 12" x 12"
- Matted original art and/or reproductions of original art
- Cards, postcards and magnets

- Towels: cotton tea towel, microfiber, flour sack
- Napkins, table cloths and other fiber arts/weaving
- Wooden or metal utensils, bowls and/or ceramic or glass
- Bowls/containers/plates/cups
- Handmade soaps

PRICING

Due to the overall environment of the market, items should be priced at less than \$100. Determining price is the responsibility of the artist in concert with B&V.

DISPLAYS AVAILABLE

- The main display is shelves set along one side of the store, and a round dining room-sized table
- There is NO hanging space, so all 2D art will need to go on easels
- We have 12 medium sized easels for use
- We have one metal greeting card rack for use
- We plan to have a flip-through bin for matted artwork at some point

The Friday before we pack, carefully loading our white pop-up tent, tables, red table cloths, canvases, bookstands, banners, boxes of Jack Handler books (my husband is an author of hard-boiled Michigan-based thrillers), and a couple of director chairs.

Early on the following morning (always the third Saturday in June), as we pull our vehicle into the line up, in spite of the darkness, we always find the friendly caffeinated Show Director, complete with red visor and clipboard—his performance is reminiscent of a maestro waving his baton, while his orchestra warms up and the music begins.

Year after year there has always been a seamless, well-organized team of GVA volunteers, ready and willing to deploy an endless supply of smiles. They show us where to unload, how to park and what to expect. Without fail we have thusly been welcomed into the East Grand Rapids neighborhood. When the day be-gins, it is always a joy to greet new and previous buyers. They are also thrilled to find out what is new and to enjoy the adventure of making new friendships.

Of course, if needed, a member of the East Grand Rapids security staff is always close by to assist. Because shoppers, kids and dogs are always welcome, with each year the Reeds Lake Art Festival has come to be viewed not only as a superb

As a vendor, even though I love greeting shoppers at my booth, invariably I still find myself at times strolling down the center of the street, meeting fellow artisans and sharing ideas and techniques. Unlike some events I have visited, the crowds are always good. That is at least in part because GVA energetically promotes the art fair, using street signs, social media, radio, and TV.

At the end of the day, the event provides every participant with the feeling of a job well done. The buyers thin and disappear, the vendors begin to pack up, the tents come down, we say our good-byes, and then the street is re-opened.

Barely a day passes before the planning for next year begins.

CALL FOR ARTISTS

Grand Valley Artists Juried Exhibition at the Forest Hills Fine Arts Center

June 1, 2020 through July 17, 2020.

Located in Grand Rapids on the far southeast side, the Forest Hills Fine Arts Center is a state-of-the-art, contemporary arts facility nestled in the beautiful natural surroundings of the Forest Hills Public Schools campus. The scenic yet expansive lobby provides a perfect venue for the display of artwork, which will be viewed by the many people who frequent the building. The exhibitions of the FHFAC are actively promoted within the community throughout the year.

Our juror, Stephen Duren, is a renowned American artist who has called West Michigan home for the past four decades. He was born and reared in the amber light of Northern California. From 1968–1972, Duren served in the U.S. Navy, stationed in Vietnam, Cuba, and Italy. After his separation from the service, he briefly remained in Europe, where he stumbled upon an exhibition of Vincent Van Gogh's work, that he says was akin to a religious experience for him. Duren's formal training in art education was at the San Francisco Art Institute (BFA) and Sacramento State University (MA). In 1978, Duren taught art in area colleges for the next six years, after which he began to work exclusively as a fine artist. From 1984–present, Duren has distinguished himself as both a plein air and studio painter. His works can be found in many private and corporate collections.

The following guidelines have been established for this exhibit:

- This exhibition will be juried to approximately 80 works. All types of art and mediums are welcome.
- All work submitted must be suitable for viewing by children in a school community.
- 3D work including sculptures is permitted; large works (more than 60" or 100lbs) need prior approval before submission. Check with Doug Klemm (616) 481-6121.
- There is no commission charged for sales. Potential purchasers will be referred to the artists by FHFAC staff.
- The FHFAC reserves the right to use the exhibition space for other activities during the exhibit. It is possible that some work may be temporarily moved.
- GVA volunteers and GVA staff will hang the exhibit with oversight of Jane Bunting, FHFAC Coordinator.
- The Opening Reception will be hosted by FHFAC and GVA.
- Awards: 1st Place \$300; 2nd Place \$200; 3rd Place \$150 and 4th Place \$100 will be selected by the juror and awarded at the opening reception.

- Entries will not be considered complete until payment is received.

PRESENTATION OF WORK

It is to your advantage to submit clear crisp images of properly photographed work. Do not shoot your images through glass! Remove artwork from the frame before photographing. It is also best to crop the images so that only the art and not the matte or frame is photographed.

- Work must be wired for hanging. Sawtooth hangers are not permitted.
- Submit original art. No giclees or other reproductions of your art will be allowed. Exception, printing original digitally created artwork.
- Framing must show good craftsmanship.
- No exposed glass edges.
- Entries will be handled with care. However, neither GVA nor the FHFAC, or staff or members of either, is responsible for loss or damage to an artist's work.
- Selected images must remain for the duration of the show.
- Please do not submit work that was previously shown in an exhibit at the FHFAC.

Juror - Jim Nawara

Jim Nawara earned a BFA degree from the Art Institute of Chicago and his MFA degree in painting at the University of Illinois, Champaign. Nawara is a Professor Emeritus of Painting & Drawing in the James Pearson Duffy Department of Art and Art History at Wayne State University in Detroit, where he taught for

forty-six years. His paintings, drawings and prints have been exhibited in more than 250 international, national, and regional group exhibitions as well as nine solo exhibitions. Nawara has received substantial research grant support for his work from Wayne State University and three Creative Artist Grants from the Michigan Council for the Arts. His work is represented in numerous museums, corporate, university and private collections.

Jim Nawara's work emanates from a continuum of ideas and observations about landscape that have intrigued him since he was a very young artist. While his compositions involve the creation of illusions and allusions concerning particular places and things in the world, Nawara has said, "I am interested in natural and unnatural visual events in landscape. These events may be grand, unimportant, profound or quirky. While an image usually evolves from an actual place, the paintings are essentially abstract configurations of shape, space, color and light that I perceive or imagine within a subject from the beginning. Ultimately the work is about interpretation, invention, and memory, as well as the physical process of painting. I consider subject matter a vehicle to express something that is ineffable, yet guided by acute observation, history, and by the inspirational works of a wide variety of fine artists, past and present."

Inspiration – where to find it, how to make it and is it really necessary?

Sometimes I get stuck for a new idea. When that happens, I generally try and switch perspectives, meaning I go to a different place, listen to a new album, or look at art I'm not familiar with, hoping any or all of these things will trigger a rush of creativity.

The time it worked the best was when Linda and I flew into Las Vegas and stayed in Boulder City, taking day trips to the Valley of Fire, Red Rock Canyon, and the Grand Canyon. Each of us took some amazing photographs. I even did one oil painting of a scene Linda shot, and I hope to do more in the future.

We chose the western part of the states after talking to Larry Blovits at a GVA function. It was clear that he's been able to draw upon that experience for years to give him inspiration in his art. Listening to stories of adventure and creativity does help your own creativity grow, especially if the stories are coming from a master of their craft.

Here's a list of other possible ways to light that creative fire!

Go for a walk, and take a camera with you. Looking through the lens makes everything more important, more clear. If you can't travel, look up places on YouTube. Think about stories your folks used to tell you, places they went, people they met. Don't be afraid to fail. The willingness to take chances often can lead to failure and, well, who cares? Maybe the next time, you'll succeed! Stop being a perfectionist and let yourself go. Clear away distractions and just focus, on anything really, just immerse yourself in the process and dig in. Reading also helps, autobiographies in particular are good for this. But really just read anything.

Speaking of reading, author Stephen King wrote the book he entitled *Thinner* because his doctor told him he needed to lose weight. King says it's important just to get up and work, keeping the same schedule every day, make a time just for your art and once you start doing it, inspiration will come. Of course, that's kind of easy for him to say!

It's not easy keeping yourself open to creativity and finding inspiration in everyday life, especially when everyday things take us far away from our art, but when we look at each other and see what we can come up with as a group, well, that's inspirational!
