

A Letter From Our President

It has been seven months since I became president of Grand Valley Artists. During this time and with the help of our board members I have learned volumes. To help prepare me for my new position, my friend Louise Bauer purchased for me a soft cover copy of Roberts Rules Of Order, Newly Revised In Brief. At this time, I have read to page four; but not to worry. I have something Henry M. Robert III does not have. I have our Grand Valley Artists board members. I cannot believe their professionalism, knowledge, and dedication to make GVA a viable and successful organization. And these are volunteer positions. How did I/you get so lucky???

I just want to remind you of the services, activities and programs provided by GVA. The board, which meets the first Thursday of each month, is charged with keeping accurate financial records, providing quality guest artists for programs, planning and organizing events such as the Reeds Lake Art Show to raise revenue for the daily functioning of our non-profit organization, generating ideas to make certain GVA continues to be a viable and exciting art organization, and scheduling figure drawing sessions at least twice a week. (Whew!) We have members who volunteer to organize plein-air outings as well as a still life painting sessions, and a portrait drawing session and a photography group. Critique, always well attended, is held the first Thursday of each month. Our volunteers organize and display your work in our gallery as well as provide artwork to decorate the boardrooms in Ed DeVries offices. Ed Devries, the owner of our building, indicated he would reduce the amount of our


rental fee if we provided artwork for his business. We sponsor two juried art shows for our members with awards, and we organize a Christmas party. We have an informative and attractive newsletter and website.

In addition to these activities, the board made minor and relevant changes to our GVA constitution. Our members approved of this revised version. We are trying to generate and experiment with new ideas. Our Legacy committee continues to meet and provide us with suggestions. Our next board meeting agenda will include responding to a 401C3 [a 25-page form] in hopes that we can raise additional monies for our organization. We want to use the arts to provide a service to our community and have asked Dixie Olin to devise creative art sessions to teach autistic children in our studio. The board composed and emailed a survey to our members to try to determine what activities you value and get your suggestions as to how we can better fulfill your needs as an artist.

I am so grateful to belong to an organization that supports both the arts and artists. The value our GVA organization provides to our members is incredible. The success of this organization in large part can be attributed to our members and our volunteers. Without our volunteers, we would not have many opportunities or activities available to our members. Thank you for being of service.

Bob Ross

I imagine many images and phrases are flooding your mind after reading those two words.

"Happy little trees." A favorite phrase he'd say as he put a tree or group of trees on one of his landscapes.

"Happy little clouds." Same thing—he'd say these words with no sense of embarrassment either. He was proud to be happy as he painted. It didn't have to be this big serious thing, it could be a gentle and relaxing pastime. I liked that.

That huge Afro. I really don't know what to say about that. He was his own man, that's for sure.

His huge smile. To say he was a happy person was an understatement. His popular show on PBS was called The Joy of Painting, so the smile fit.

The eerie similarities between Bob Ross and Fred Rogers, host of Mister Roger's Neighborhood. Both were softspoken men who never talked down to you. It was this calm, steady, supportive tone that drew you in.

The list goes on.

Recently, Jim Johnson told a story about painting in a park (he leads our Plein Air group sessions) and some teens came by and checked out his work. They commented that Jim's painting was good, but he was no Bob Ross. I'm not sure if Jim took that as a compliment or not – but he got a big kick out of their comment as would I if someone compared my paintings with Bob Ross's.


One thing is for sure though, Bob taught an untold number of people how to enjoy oil painting. I watched his show countless times, though I never got out my paints to join in with his lessons. I wasn't alone in this. A good question would be is how many of the people who watched his show ever lifted a brush. I asked several of my friends who I know aren't artists if they ever watched the Joy of Painting, and many did, but none actually did so to learn how to paint – they did because it was fun watching Bob have such a good time painting. PBS says that only ten percent of the people who tune in do so to learn how to paint.

He did 403 episodes and three paintings per show. One was hidden off screen and used to copy from. His work wasn't spontaneous, even though it seemed like he was creating each work off the top of his head. His first copy was done for the TV show, and the third painting was done as it was being photographed for his how-to paint book series. That's a lot of paintings. He donated most of his work to PBS stations to auction off or for fund raisers.

Bob used a wet-on-wet technique of painting called Alla Prima. You don't wait for the painting to dry between steps, but keep going until it's finished. Since oils take so long to dry, you can work on a painting for several hours, or several days before it's complete. This style has been used since the sixteenth century by such notable painters as Rembrandt, Claude Monet and John Singer Sargent. It became quite popular with the impressionists. Many of GVA's painters use this approach, especially at sketch and plein air sessions.

He passed away in 1995, but his shows are still in reruns, mostly on PBS stations and You Tube, where his shows have gotten tens of thousands of viewings.

I can't say I actually like Bob Ross's work though. They're kind of generic landscapes, nothing too interesting or something that you'd like to stare at for any length of time. But Mr. Ross was a good teacher. He taught – and still does teach – people how to be happy, how to find something they enjoy, and work to improve on it. Was he a master artist? Maybe, maybe not, but he inspires countless people to aspire to become masters themselves. Now that's a good teacher.


"Without guidance from my teachers and mentors, I would probably have been limited to my beginning stage of 'point and shoot' photography," says Mary. "For
